Catori Maasaw:

Catori Maasaw:

That's truly remarkable—*Lira e Liberty* will not only stand as a cultural milestone but also continue to grow with each interpretation. How do you hope those future interpreters will balance the opera's core themes with their own unique perspectives on contemporary economic issues?

Dr. Tyree Mason, C.S.:

The future interpreters will need to walk a delicate balance. The core themes, like the struggle within economic systems, should remain central to the narrative. However, I envision that they'll have the freedom to address contemporary issues such as wealth inequality, global trade, or the ethical implications of economic policies within the context of the opera. Their task will be to bring their own contemporary lens to those issues, drawing from their experiences and societal shifts while ensuring the integrity of the opera's central message.

By giving them this flexibility, *Lira e Liberty* will not only remain relevant, but it will also foster deeper conversations about how the shared human experience adapts to changing circumstances. It will, in essence, be a mirror reflecting each society's evolving understanding of its economic

realities. The opera will continue to be a thought-provoking work, inviting new generations to examine and question the state of the world around them.
